July 29 Workday

The July workday saw a number of chores, big and small, made easier by many hands (also big and small).

First, we're making significant progress on getting the irrigation system up to where it was intended to be.

Over the years, it suffered various breakdowns and

leaks, which is of course quite normal. However, during the past two decades, much of the knowledge of how the system works as a whole has been lost, or at least was not known to those repairing it. As a result, many of the repairs, while effective, attacked just the specific problem isolated

from the system as a whole. Thus many areas of the course haven't been watered effectively, and often we've set out hand sprinklers to ensure critical areas such as the approach to the ninth green received water. Now, however, a team has set about restoring the system to what it is truly capable of. They're not done, not by a long shot, but they're making progress – good progress that's doubly helpful in this drought year.

One place the sprinklers seemed to work overtime was on the first tee, weathering the yardage sign to near-unreadability and causing the bushes to obscure both that sign and the large course-rules notice. We repainted the yardage sign and cleaned up the shrubbery around both signs. We also repainted the Welcome sign at the entrance to the course and replaced the rotting newel posts surrounding it.

The work day team also weeded around the clubhouse and pulled out the invasive Oregon grape.

In various ongoing tasks, the divot mix boxes and ball washers were refilled (even put a few new green towels out), we picked up the trash, and we gathered a lifetime supply of pine cones. (Short lifetime,

unfortunately. They're sure to have been replenished by the next work day.)

In addition, we had a wonderful lunch of chicken alfredo and macaroni, salad, and ice-cream-topped brownies.

The next work day is August 26th. Why not come out? There's a pine cone with your name on it, and there's a rumor going around that you can get a free mulligan for each hour worked. (The rumor is likely false, but we can dream, right?)




